Shell HQ news reports

18/03/2016:

450 people went missing when we lost communication with Shell HQ, a remote underwater research facility on the seabed, off the coast of Stewart Island, New Zealand. There is communication with the research facility via a cable, and they have 5 submarines of the best quality. Shell HQ is shaped like a shell, and is made of the best quality material, so a leak is improbable. The police were called at 2PM yesterday and the voice on the other end wasn't very clear, which was unusual, and there were some buzzing sounds as well. They couldn't tell if the voice was male or female, but it sounded very scared. It said:

"Help! The (buzz) that Doctor (buzz) made (buzz) coming! It has almost gotten to the (buzz)! Oh no! Here it comes! Come quickly!" Then there was a screaming sound and the line went dead. Police submarines are going down to investigate. They have not come back.

19/03/2016:

The police submarines have now come back from investigating the mystery of Shell HQ. They have rescued one person, who is in hospital, babbling about monsters and experiments going wrong. The police were just about to leave the lab when there was a hissing sound. They did not stop to find out what it was that had made it, and they ran back to the submarine and left.

20/03/2016:

We have finally gotten the rescued person from the Shell HQ research facility to talk. His name is Mr James Pricely and he was a cleaner at the lab. He didn't know much about the experiments, but he knew they went wrong when he heard hissing sounds. The doctors think he's hallucinating, but he claims he saw a giant crab that had eight arms like an octopus coming down the hallway. He says it smashed anything in its way and grabbed a scientist, putting her into its mouth. It was followed by another, and another! He can't remember what happened from then to when he woke up in hospital.

21/03/2016:

More policemen have been sent down to the research facility Shell HQ with extra gear to see if they can find out what happened, or pick up more survivors. One submarine has come back with 2 rescued people, and they say that the rest are still searching. The 2 rescued people have been recognised as Doctor Stanley Moore and Doctor Maggie Masters, two scientists from the lab.

22/03/2016:

Another police submarine from Shell HQ has returned, with notes from a scientist on a piece of paper. They say they had to put on gas masks to reach the piece of paper, because there was gas in the air. The piece of paper is being read at this moment, but it is in very bad handwriting. Doctor Stanley Moore appears to have died in hospital, after suffering from breathing in a type of poisonous smoke. Doctor Maggie Masters is still alive, and she has told us

even more about this case. Apparently they were mixing squid ink with hydrogen, helium and shark saliva to study the mixture, after one scientist, whose name is unknown, said that he thought that it would make a type of laughing gas when heated. There were certainly no monsters involved, and Mr Pricely is beginning to realise that he was only hallucinating.

23/3/2016:

The note picked up at Shell HQ research facility has been read, and supports Doctor Masters in what she said about the experiment. The young doctor is still in hospital, but Mr Pricely is now out of hospital, although badly shaken up. The submarines have returned, and the policemen have confirmed that there are no monsters at the lab. There is a crack in the glass in the gigantic test tube in the room where the experiment was tested in, and it seems like the mixture turned out to be poisonous. When the glass cracked, the gas came out and when the scientists breathed it in, they died. Many corpses found on the ground and the ever-lingering smoke prove this statement to be correct. The hissing sound that Mr Pricely heard earlier in the case was the mixture escaping from the test tube and into the lab. The case is now closed, but we are very sad to lose the 448 people who died due to this disaster, and the 2 who lived will never be the same again.
